dylan's story

Dylan James Brown was born on December 16, 2008. He is, by far, the most special gift we have ever received.

He was ten months old when he caught an extremely common virus, which for unknown reasons, took an extremely uncommon approach and attacked his brainstem. The brainstem is the signal / communication pathway between the brain and the rest of the body. It appears to play a role in nearly every function of the body. The virus's attack, and resulting encephalitis, caused damage to his brainstem. Dylan has been on life support since October 2009, as he is no longer able to breathe on his own. He is not able to blink, show facial expressions, speak, or even eat without a feeding tube. We know he can still hear to some extent, but we are not certain about his ability to see. The doctors cannot tell us whether he will get better or to what extent his condition may improve (but they can't tell us he won't improve either). We elected to store Dylan's umbilical cord blood when he was born, and we are hopeful that his own stored stem cells can rejuvenate the damaged areas of Dylan's brain. With your help, we hope to support research and clinical trials to help children with brain injuries.

We miss Dylan more than we can express, and in our hearts we are still convinced that something special is going to happen for him. Only now have we learned what the real meaning of "hope" is...









more electrical impulses are generated in 1 day by a single human brain than by all the telephones in the world

the brain is the most complex organ which is often credited with what makes us "human". it gives us the Capacity for personality, memories, highly coordinated movements, how we sense the world, art, language, moral judgments, and even rational thought.

despite medical advances, still relatively little is known about the brain (especially compared with what we know about other organs). there are no known procedures to actually repair damaged areas of the brain.

the field of regenerative medicine offers hope for discovering ways to repair damaged areas of the brain. it holds the promise of regenerating damaged tissues and cells for implantation in efforts to stimulate the brain to heal itself.

head trauma is a leading cause of childhood hospitalization, and we hope to improve the prognosis for recovery by supporting and sponsoring regenerative medicine research.
